FLOWER SHOW- SEPT. 11

On Saturday, September 11, the Country Hills Garden Club will present "Paths of Beauty", a standard flower show. All residents of Country Club Hills are urged to visit the show at Layton Hall School between the hours of 3 p.m. and 6 p.m.

Following are the general rules for exhibitors:

1. Entries are open to the public.
2. All entries must be placed by the exhibitor.
3. Containers for horticulture will be provided by the committee, except where noted.
4. More than one entry may be made in the Horticulture class, provided it is a different variety.
5. All horticulture specimens must be grown by the exhibitor and been in his possession at least three months.
6. Plant material for the Artistic Division need not be garden grown.
7. Fresh cut plant material must predominate. Foliage and accessories will be permitted unless otherwise noted.
8. Plant material must be listed on a 3x5 card for each artistic arrangement.
9. An exhibitor may have only one entry in each class in Artistic Division.
10. Entries not conforming to the rules of the show may be disqualified.
11. The Show Committee reserve the right to combine or subdivide classes where warranted, also to remove entries not of exhibit condition.

There are three major divisions and several subdivisions or classes. Division I (Horticulture) includes sections for annuals and perennials, bulbs and rhizomes, cut stems, dahlias, and roses. Division II (Artistic Arrangements) includes eight classes. These classes have the colorful names, "Down the Yellow Road", "A Walk in Space", "By the Sea", "Bali Hai", "Through the Looking Glass", "... and Through the Woods", "Memory Lane", and "Crooked Mile".

Division III is the Educational - Conservation Exhibit.

Tickets costing \$.25 are being sold by garden club members and will be on sale at the flower show. Contact any member of the garden club for further information.

NAMES FRANK JOHNS DIRECTOR

The Fairfax Community Theatre Inc. announces that Mr. Frank Johns of Falls Church, Va. has been selected as resident director for its 1965-66 season.

"The Devil's Disciple" will be his first play this fall. He will conduct tryouts for the Shavian comedy on Saturday, September 11 and on Sunday, September 12 at 2:00 p.m., and on Tuesday, September 14, at 8:00 p.m. in room 306 of the Fairfax City Hall.

Mr. Johns, a speech and drama student at George Washington University, has an impressive background in all phases of the theater. He started his acting career at the age of six and has acted, directed and worked backstage ever since.

He has been connected with the Children's Theatre Guild of George Washington University, The Oxen Hill Community Theatre, Theatre Lobby, The Arlington Opera Company, and the Children's Theatre of Washington.

After graduating from J.E.B. Stuart High School in Fairfax County, he went on to study at the University of New Mexico. He then

returned to the Washington area to study with Dr. L. P. Leggette, Chairman of the Speech and Drama Department at George Washington University and President of the newly formed Fairfax County Cultural Association.

In March, Mr. Johns directed the first place entry of "27 Wagons Full of Cotton" in the Washington D. C. Recreation Department One-Act Play Tournament. He also directed "The Happy Time", "The Sandbox", and "King Arthur's Sword" during the past year.

Mr. Johns enjoys working with children. He feels that they should be introduced to the world of drama as soon as possible and that the best way to do it is through creative dramatics classes. This fall he will teach classes for youngsters on Saturday mornings in Fairfax for the Community Theatre. During the past year he administered the Creative Dramatics Program for children at the Fairfax YWCA under the sponsorship of George Washington University.
