

DANGEROUS CHOCOLATE CAKE IN A MUG

Be a responsible pet owner – pick up your animal's waste and dispose of it properly (in the trash or toilet.) Do not contaminate streams and storm drains. Information: 703-385-7816

Hiring a Contractor: Before You Do!

- Ask to see a valid contractor's license
- Doing constructional modification? Ensure that the license has a BLD classification
- Discuss and decide upon the nitty-gritty in advance and have the contractor incorporate those details into your final written agreement or contract
- If you're asking multiple contractors to submit bids, give them your specifications and ask each to work up a contract. Don't approach the one you perceive as most competent, ask him or her to create a detailed contract, and then give that document to the others so they can use it to submit a bid. This is not only unethical on your part, but you may end up with quotes from other contractors who don't understand the work or who may try to cut corners just to get your business
- Find out who's doing and/or supervising the work the law requires them to be on site or directly supervising the work
- Don't subdivide the work necessary to create a finished product unless you're qualified to do so.

 Unless you're ready to hold yourself accountable for the results, don't try to dumb the work down or drive the price down so that it meets unrealistically simplistic expectations.

Disposing of Unwanted, Unneeded Medicine

Need to clean out your medicine cabinet and don't know the most environmentally sound way to dispose of stuff you don't need?

- Package drugs carefully (so others won't be exposed to the drugs), and put into the garbage immediately before pickup.
- Leave medication in its original, childproof container labeled with the drug's name, so officials can
 identify the substance in the unlikely event someone finds and ingests it. Remove or obliterate the
 patient information for privacy.
- Make drugs unappealing. Dumpster divers will find medications that are mixed with a little water and some kitty litter, flour, or a nontoxic spice (like hot pepper) unappealing.
- Seal the drugs in a brown paper bag or box, and place the package in the trash as close as possible to garbage pickup time.
- Be particularly careful with liquids, especially if they are in glass bottles. Seal them into a ziplock bag
 or a plastic container, so if they break, others will not be exposed.

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency now discourages flushing medications down the toilet because sewage treatment plants cannot remove pharmaceutical and personal care product residue from water. The drugs you flush end up in our drinking water, rivers, lakes and streams.

Penny Saved, Iceberg Earned?

Install faucet aerators.

Aerators attach to the end of faucets and restrict water flow through the faucet. These small easy to install gadgets can save up to 50% of normal water use, thus reducing the water heating bill.

Proper Use of your Dishwasher

.If you don't need your dishes right away, avoid using the "heated dry" setting on your dishwasher Instead let them air dry.

Avoid opening the oven door while cooking.

One peep at the food inside can change the oven temperature by 25°F.

Turn Off the Lights

Turn off the lights whenever you leave the room, even if you are only leaving the room for a few minutes. Probably one of the most oft-repeated reminders. It's a small task but it saves energy .

Replace your incandescent light bulbs with compact **fluorescent** ones. You save up to 75% energy and reduce your electric bill accordingly. Visit: www.energystar.gov

The sale of incandescent bulbs is already prohibited in Australia and will be in the European Union in 2014. We were 100 years behind in adopting the Julian calendar, and hopefully it won't take us that long to discontinue the use of incandescent light bulbs.



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
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APRIL IS CITY OF FAIRFAX CLEAN-UP MONTH
