GETTING TO KNOW YOU-FEATURED BOARD MEMBERS



City Ends Mail Delivery of CityScene

The June issue of the City of Fairfax CityScene was the last issue the city plans to send by mail to every household. While the city encourages everybody to access the CityScene on its website, individuals may request future mail delivery by calling 703-385-7855. The current issue and previous issues are available online through the city's website. To receive an email notification from the City when the latest issue is posted, sign up for the eMAS service offered on the city's website. You can *always* access the latest City-Scene on OUR website www.cchca.org by clicking on the CityScene link; it's faster and easier than going to the City of Fairfax website!

New Storm Drain Markers

The City has supplied us with additional storm drain markers for any unmarked storm inlets in our neighborhood. The markers are important reminders that everything that goes into the storm inlets ends up in our creek and can potentially harm the plant and animal life of the Chesapeake Bay watershed. If you know of any inlets that are missing their markers email the closest street address to the address above or call Judy Fraser at 703-825-7022 and we'll get a new one installed.

Cue Bus Info

Every Cue bus is now outfitted with bike racks. CUE Bus schedules can be downloaded to your handheld device at www.commuterpage.com/handheld and are on the City's website. Riders can pay their fare with Metro SmarTrip cards, as well as with cash (exact change is required) or by purchasing a book of 10 tickets. The current fare is \$1.35, GMU students, staff and faculty with a valid ID ride free, and children age 3 and younger ride free. Elementary, intermediate and high school students, senior citizens (age 60 and older), and persons with disabilities with a valid ID ride for 65¢. Also note that on Friday July 3rd the bus will run on a Saturday schedule and there will be be no bus service on the 4th.

Independence Day Schedule

City offices and the Senior Center will be closed on Friday, July 3rd, and the Civil War Interpretive Center will be closed on July 4th. County libraries will be closed both days. Check the City's website for details.

No More Valet Trash Service

As of June 30th the city is no longer going to bring homeowner's trash cans to the curb as part of its regular service. The city, however, will provide special set-out service for those who are physically unable to carry their bins to the curb. To receive this service call 703-385-7995.

With start of summer, the days are longer, the kids are out of school and outdoor activities abound. But summer also brings some of the most active weather of the year for our region. One of the most common weather events that we have in the summer are thunderstorms. Here are a few steps you can take to make you and your family prepared for these events:

When a Storm Approaches:

- Find shelter in a building or car. Keep car windows closed and avoid convertibles.
- Telephone lines and metal pipes can conduct electricity. Avoid using the telephone or any electrical appliances. (Leaving electric lights on, however, does not increase the chances of your home being struck by lightning.)
- Avoid taking a bath or shower, or running water for any other purpose.
- Turn off the air conditioner. Power surges from lightning can overload the compressor, resulting in a costly repair job!
- Draw blinds and shades over windows. If windows break due to objects blown by the wind, the shades will prevent glass from shattering into your home.

If You are Caught Outside:

- Seek shelter in a structure if you can.
- If not, go to a low-lying, open place away from trees, poles, or metal objects.
- Make sure the place you pick is not subject to flooding.
- Be a very small target! Squat low to the ground. Place your hands on your knees with your head between them. Make yourself the smallest target possible.
- Do not lie flat on the ground-this will make you a larger target!

In some cases, storms can be severe and are accompanied by high winds or tornadoes that can cause significant damage and result in blackouts and the loss of other basic services. In order to be prepared for summer storms, here are a few things you should have in your disaster supply kit in your home:

- First aid kit and essential medications.
- Canned food and can opener.
- At least three gallons of water per person.
- Protective clothing, bedding, or sleeping bags.
- Battery-powered radio, flashlight, and extra batteries. Due to the extreme risk of fire, do not use candles during a power outage.
- Special items for infant, elderly, or disabled family members.
- Written instructions on how to turn off electricity, gas, and water if authorities advise you to do so.

Also remember to keep your car fuel tank at least half full because gas stations rely on electricity to power their pumps. Thank you to Ernie Klimonda for sharing these tips with us. Do YOU have recycling tips you would like to share?

Recycle: One recycled aluminum can saves as much energy as it takes to run a TV set for four hours or the equivalent of $\frac{1}{2}$ gallon of gasoline. Recycling aluminum cans reduces the need for raw material by 95% and reduces the energy needed to produce aluminum by 90%.

Light bulbs: "It's actually less energy efficient to turn them off if you're gone for only a few minutes. They require a "start-up" time to reach their full brightness (~15 minutes) which requires more energy than simply maintaining them. They literally need to warm up. That's why CFLs aren't recommended for use in locations like bathrooms or utility sheds. As with all energy concerns, there is no silver bullet incandescents in some places, CFLs in others and LEDs in others yet. . . " says Michael Lawrence (antisthenes@gmail.com) - CFL's use lot of energy getting started, and frequently switching the light on and off will shorten the lamp's life efficiency. They are energy-efficient only if used for an hour or more.

One 18-watt CFL provides the light of a 75-watt incandescent bulb (ILB) and last 10 times as long; over its useful life it saves 80 pounds of coal, translating into 250 pounds less of carbon dioxide released into the Earth's atmosphere.

Automobiles: Most automobiles get about 28% more miles per gallon of fuel at 50 mph that at 70 mph, and about 21% more at 55 mph that at 70 mph. Underinflated tires waste one gallon out of every 20 gallons of gasoline. To save fuel, follow that automaker's guidelines on recommended air pressure levels for the tires. Greater fuel economy can be achieved by inflating tires to the maximum air pressure listed on the sidewall of the tire, resulting in less rolling resistance. It's more economical to turn the engine off rather than let it idle if the idle time would exceed 60 seconds. At speeds greater than 40 mph, less fuel is used in driving a car with the air conditioner on and the windows up that with the windows rolled down, due to the air drag effect. The faster one drives (within the speed limits) the more fuel is saved with the windows up.

The current total balance of the CCHCA account is \$4,498.28. This is comprised of \$1,563.67 in 'Restricted' funds, and \$3,149.11 in 'Unrestricted funds. Restricted funds are provided by grants, and are therefore to be used for specific community initiatives, such as the landscaping of public areas. Your membership dues supply the Unrestricted balance, which goes towards food and supplies for wonderful CCH events such as the Ice Cream Social and upcoming Labor Day Picnic.




