member. Our board is an engaged and capable group and it is a pleasure to work with such fine neighbors.

We were pleased to have historian Andrea Lowenwarter join us at the annual meeting and give a brief history of the Wilcoxsons, the family who built Blenheim and owned the farm on which CCH was built. Andrea shared with us some interesting photos of "pre-CCH" and stories of the impact of the Civil War on the family. This area has seen many changes.

As many of you know we have an historic Oak tree on Brookwood that has seen it all since the Revolutionary War and somehow survived the construction of our ramblers! The Brookwood Oak is also a stately reminder that we can be participants and observers of a natural world that has many stories to tell as well. Although we may not be "nature whisperers", we can, by being careful observers and stewards, learn a lot and participate in a world of activity occurring all around us. According to noted entomologist Douglas Tallamy, one oak tree can support more than 500 different species of insects and animals. And he wasn't even counting us! But we count on trees for their air filtering, water absorption, and shade. Mature trees have an exponentially greater ability to provide these services than young ones. Even though urban trees are under a lot of stress compared to their woodland relatives, with proper care many of our trees in CCH will perform all of these services for a very long time, and will be a wonderful and inspiring legacy for each of us and our community. As part of our Common Area grant work this spring, we planted two canopy trees, a Scarlet Oak and a Pignut Hickory, and although only 5 or 6 feet tall now, we hope those two will someday be majestic residents of our Common Area. On June 28th, we'll be hosting a tree care information session from 5-7pm at the Common Area.

#### **CCH BEAUTY SPOT**

Driving through Country Club Hills this week, we were struck by all the blooming rose bushes. They seem particularly lush and vibrant this year. One yard really mesmerized us: Congratulations to Heather and Jason Gray of 9919 Farr Drive—you are the winners of the June Beauty Spot of the Month!

The large blocks of knock-out roses flanking the driveway and along the front of the house are captivating, festooned with deep red flowers. After you let their beauty feed your soul, begin to look around. This yard is brimming with gardening inspirations!

There are raised beds (at the top and right side of the driveway) planted with a specimen red Japanese maple, azaleas that just finished blooming, and lariope that will bloom later this summer; a window box bursting with purple baby-bell petunias; and a hardscape sidewalk (on the right border of the property, gently curving to the back yard) edged by a lovely row of hydrangeas flowering in soothing shades of light blues and pastel purples, boxwood, crepe myrtle, and hostas.

The gardens are rounded out with trees and shrubs (dogwood, Otto Luyken laurel, rhododendron, evergreen); juniper, vinca minor, and pachysandra as ground cover; and flowers (asters and daylilies) and ornamental grasses to add visual interest.

#### AUDUBON PROGRAM ARRIVED THIS SPRING IN CCH!

CCH is lucky to be surrounded by remnants of woods and stream valley which support numerous animals and insects, including owls, hawks, box turtles, woodpeckers, swallowtails and so many more. For many CCHers the lovely parkland and open space was an important factor in deciding to move here. But the natural areas are struggling from the onslaught of invasive plants, heavy deer browse, pollutants and insecticide spraying. As part of CCHCA's efforts to care for our Common Area and the Accotink, Northern Virginia Audubon Society representatives met with residents on April 18 to explain how their Audubon at Home program can help us support the natural habitat along the Accotink at our Common Area and around our homes.

This is a fun program that entails observation and identification of insects and animals and taking steps to provide natural cover, food and shelter for them. The program goal is to make sure our yards and common spaces are good habitats, and focuses on species which are experiencing severe population decline. If you see 10 of the 30 species the Audubon Society has identified as at risk then you can apply to be certified a wildlife sanctuary. We hope to successfully complete the program at the Common Area this summer and encourage homeowners to participate both at the Common Area and at your own home. For the Common Area, you will find a binder with information about the program and our observation log in the book box.

If you decide to certify your own yard, let CCHCA know! The more yards that are good habitats, the better we can support our local flora and fauna. More information about the program can also be found at www.audubonva.org.

#### WHAT'S GOING ON AT THE COMMONS?

In late March CCHCA applied for a \$500 matching grant from the City of Fairfax Community Appearance Committee to support our effort to make the Commons area more attractive and more native plant oriented. In early April we received confirmation that our proposal was accepted. Thank you to David Stearman for creating such a professional proposal.

We had our first community work day at the Commons on April 18. Our work in the Commons this year begins a multi-year project toward sustainability and native plants. Besides weeding, edging, and mulching the whole area, we began a concentrated effort on the area in front of the sign, clearing out the plants that grow too tall and planting sedges and other native groundcovers and plants that will require less maintenance in the future and support local wildlife. We are excited to begin and know that we and our furry and feathered neighbors will benefit for years to come. Thank you to everyone who came out to help: Country Hills Garden Club members Polly Feuer (and her daughter), Teresina Christy, Nancy LeBow, and Betty Russell, along with CCH neighbors Judy and Doug Fraser, and Ariel Harwick. Thank you also to Joyce and Len Skoglund for taking time on another day, clearing out the area in front of the sign and planting low-growing native grasses.

During our work day on April 18, we also met with Terrence Liercke and Barbara Tuset from the Audubon Society to discuss our community's participating in the Audubon At Home wildlife sanctuary program. This fun program is open to homeowners, churches, schools, businesses, and homeowner associations.

Everyone can participate! We have a blue binder in our excellent book lending box by the pavilion. Inside the binder is a list of species and a log to make notes of observations.

For the Common Area to be certified as a wildlife habitat under the program, we need to observe at least 10 of 30 species that the Northern Virginia Audubon Society has identified as in need of additional habitat in Northern Virginia. More information about the program is in the binder and at <u>audubonva.org</u>. This is an education and awareness program and does not limit use of the Common Area in any way. If you have any questions, please contact Judy Fraser at <u>president@cchca.org</u>. On May 3, we had a second work day at the Commons. Thanks to the matching grant from the city, combined with funding from CCHCA that was provided by the Country Hills Garden Club as well as individual donations, we were able to purchase several native trees and plants, including oak and hickory trees, serviceberry bushes, and redbuds. Community members planted those trees and plants, as well as a dozen native seedlings throughout the gardens. Thanks to Judy and Doug Fraser, the Salva family, Dia Pullen, Georgia Laxton, and Teresina Christy for your assistance!

To make sure that the newly planted seedlings and perennials at the Commons area get enough water this summer, we have created an online watering schedule (<u>www.signupgenius.com/go/</u> <u>10c044caba623ab9-common</u>). Basically, we've divided the summer into weeks and are asking that you sign up as a water steward for a week at a time (as many as you want).

Your responsibility is to make sure that the new plants have enough water during your week. If it rains, you are off the hook! If it is extra dry, you may need to make two trips during the week to water.

The other "water stewards" can show you where and how much to water. It shouldn't take more than an hour per watering, and no more than two times during the week (again, only if it doesn't rain). We have a rain barrel with watering cans at the pavilion for our water source. A neighbor has generously offered to keep the barrel full, so we will let them know when it is getting low. You can use the "my comment" box on the sign up to record the day(s) that you watered so the next person will know when the plants were last watered.

We will be having more Commons Area work days throughout the summer. We look forward to seeing you down at the Commons both for these volunteer days and for all the wonderful activities that take place there and make our neighborhood such a great place to live! Thanks to all the dedicated weeders, mulchers, planters, and waterers who are helping to make our CCH Commons beautiful!

### **Attention City of Fairfax Residents:**

\*\*Telephone Scam Alert\*\*

Please be aware of following telephone scams that have recently occurred in the Northern Virginia Region.

<u>IRS/Tax Scam</u>: Suspects call and claim to be an IRS agent and state that you owe taxes. The unknown caller may also claim that you will be arrested if you do not pay the tax debt. The called will usually request that you purchase a prepaid credit card or green dot card and give them the numbers on the card.

<u>Green Dot Scam</u>: Suspects call and allege that the victim has committed some type of criminal violation or they pretend to be a family member in need of monetary help. The suspect then requests that the victims immediately go to a nearby store and purchase a Green Dot money card and provide the numbers on the card to the suspect.

<u>Jury Duty Scam</u>: Suspects contact citizens and state that the victim has missed a scheduled day of jury duty. The suspect tells the victim that they will be arrested if they do not pay a fine in the form of a Green Dot money card or a wire transfer.

<u>DEA Extortion Scam</u>: Suspects contact citizens via telephone and accuse them of illegally purchasing drugs or medications over the telephone or internet. The suspect claims to be a DEA agent and tells the victim that they will be arrested for this offense unless they agree to pay a fine and wire the money.
