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
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Watermelon!

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July, 2017 Beauty Spot of the Month

Congratulations to the Fitzgeralds, our CCH neighbors at 3419 Country Hill Drive! The landscape at their home has been selected as the July, 2017 Beauty Spot of the Month. CCH owners of corner lots have used many landscape designs to beautify their extra wide front and side yards. The Fitzgeralds have enhanced the curb appeal of their home by transforming their outdoor space into a lovely private retreat.

When traveling on Old Lee Highway past the side yard of this home, one first notices the row of mature cypress trees at the edge of the property. These closely planted tall evergreens with feathery, emerald leaves form an attractive privacy wall next to the sidewalk. At the corner of the property, one's attention is captured by the glossy leaves of a magnolia tree with widespreading branches that are adorned with fragrant white blossoms in the spring. The dense foliage of these ornamental trees extends to the ground and serves as a yearround screen to block the distractions of pedestrian and car traffic.

On the opposite side of the natural green fence, a remarkable variety of trees, shrubs, and flowers comes into view. To the left of the driveway, several holly trees and a towering maple shade a level area of turf with plenty of open space for family outdoor activities. Powder blue hydrangea flowers brighten the rear boundary. To the right of the driveway, in the middle of the lawn, two dogwoods provide a colorful focal point through the change of seasons. Plantings of contrasting sizes and colors fill the sunny gardens along the house founda-





tion. Large euonymus and aucuba with variegated gold and green leaves and mounds of low-growing blue star junipers parallel the front wall. Nandinas dress up the house corners with cascading white summer flowers and red winter berries. Perennial flower beds near the main entrance feature azalea and wood sedge. Liriope grass and dwarf boxwood border the walkway leading to the doorstep accented with potted pink begonias and purple verbe-

Prominently located at an entrance to Country Club Hills, this attractive property makes a lasting impression on residents and visitors in the neighborhood. The Fitzgeralds garner many compliments, especially on a national holiday when they display patriotic decorations for all to enjoy!




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Are you a member of CCHCA?

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COMMUNITY APPEARANCE

We have a wonderful stream coursing along our neighborhood, which you can enjoy from the Spring Lake Terrace path bridge or by following the woodsy paths at the common area. Our CCH stream is part of the Accotink Creek that winds its way down to Lake Accotink and eventually flows out to the Potomac River. When I was a kid we liked to make rafts out of twigs and grass blades and send them down the "river" of water in the street gutter that flowed during rainstorms. Maybe those rafts made it to the Potomac! Today, unfortunately lots of trash and debris enter the creek via the storm sewer system. In CCH the Civic Association hosts a stream clean up once or twice a year to reduce the amount of litter in the creek, and volunteers with Friends of Accotink Creek diligently tackle clean ups all along the tributaries of the Accotink in the spring and fall.

But we can do our part every day by making sure that trash goes in the trash and that nothing manmade gets into the storm sewer inlets. In fact, something as ubiquitous as cigarette butts may be small but they are lethal. The butt of the cigarette contains all the harmful toxins that the filters are keeping out of the smokers' lungs - once in the stream many of those toxins simply, and fatally, leach into the water, and even the filters are not biodegradable these days and end up in the intestines and stomachs of aquatic animals. So not only is keeping our neighborhood trashfree aesthetically desirable but it is a simple way to protect our creek and its many inhabitants!

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
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
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My New Abode, by Kon Rhyu of 3403 Andover Dr.

On a fine Spring day, with new house keys jiggling in my hand, my wife and I stepped out of the settlement office. After dutifully signing endless documents with robotic fervor, the contract was finalized and we were more than ready to get out and head to our new house. We put the pedal to the metal and pulled into the driveway of our new house in no time. Up until this moment, we were in a mind set of utility, characterized by the legal and financial process of buying a house. But the very moment we stepped out of the car, the realization that we now belong to this house and the neighborhood hit us with feelings of excitement, hope, and uncertainty.

Fast forward to ten months later, I'm sitting in my dining room tinkering with and trying to restore a Mid Century Modern lighting fixture original to homes like ours. As I hold this object from the 50's and start cleaning, my mind starts to wander to the lifestyle of former inhabitants of this house. What were they like? Did they enjoy living in this house and the neighborhood? What were their hopes and aspirations?

I can imagine theirs probably were not far off from mine at the



core. Basically we all want a little piece of safe and nourishing haven where we can come home and relax after a hard day of work and where our children can grow up happily and reach their full potential. We also want a place to be responsive to our changing needs as we grow older.

So far, our house and the neighborhood meet our family's needs and we are happy to call this place our home. And that feeling of uncertainty we had when we first moved in has dissipated in the course of numerous community events, backyard BBQs, house renovations, and settling kids into new schools and activities.

I still have a long list of house work and places to explore around the neighborhood. But I feel that, mentally, I am gradually beginning to take ownership of our home and our community.

Dominion Power Presentation

On 17 July, Dominion Virginia Power gave a presentation to the boards of Country Club Hills, Great Oaks, and Ridge Avenue developments. I attended for CCH and here is a brief summary of the information covered. Rick Landis and Leslie McMillan presented from the Reliability Department. Leslie is actually the operations specialist for Fairfax City. CCH has two circuits coming into the neighborhood. 679 comes in on Fairfax High School side and 872 on the St. Leo side. 872 is actually the more reliable circuit and also feeds into Sherwood Center and the police station.

Dominion Power has added disconnects to isolate problems so that fewer houses lose power. They have been checking the condition of their substations, the load on local transformers to make sure it isn't too much, tree trimming all year, replacing switches on the main lines, and performing thermal scans to measure heat coming off their equipment. Automation is being added, overvoltage protec-

tion installed, and some undergrounding of lines was completed behind CCH on the Spring Lake Terrace side.

Scheduled improvements for the next year affect Circuit 679, which we share with Great Oaks. They will be performing upline reconditioning which consists of replacing poles and lines for the main line coming into CCH. Also planned is some undergrounding of lines which can be done on single tab lines (they branch off main lines and serve one street). Park Hill Place is planned first due to having the most outages. The other two single tab lines are Farr and Country Hill which have almost reached the criteria for undergrounding.

The CCH Board will consider asking these two Dominion Power representatives to come to one of our next board meetings at which time members of the neighborhood could come to voice their concerns and ask questions. Stay tuned for more information.
