Ten Recycling Opportunities

If clutter reduction is among your 2007 resolutions, but you think, "What a waste," when you have to throw out so much stuff, consider these recycling opportunities:

- 1. Cell phones. Take them to any FedEx Kinkos, Staples, or Office Depot. They will re-program them to be used in developing countries.
- 2. Old sheets, towels and pillow cases. Most animal shelters need old sheets and towels. The County shelter is always looking. Homeward Trails, a local mixed-breed dogs and cat rescue, accepts donations on specific weekends; contact Laura Bandini at bandini@botmail.com
- **3.** Not-this-year's-color sheets and towels. Programs that help people move from institutionalized care to apartments need complete/matching sets of sheets and towels in good condition for their clients. Try The Green Door, 1623 16th Street NW, Washington, DC 20009, telephone 202-462-4092.
- **4. Leftover yarn.** Prayer shawl ministries often need yarn. Gladys Seisler represents Naughty Knitters they only knit for charities and have donated more than 5,000 items to babies and children, and to senior citizens in need in the past 12 years. Her contact info is *GGSeis@aol.com*.
- **5.** Metro cards with just cents left. Mail them to Maureen Jais-Mick, c/o The Green Door, 1623 16th Street NW, Washington, DC 20009. This program consolidates them, and uses the fare to help mentally ill clients go to appointments, work, etc.
- **6.** Computers, monitors, printers, scanners, etc. Do not trash, please; dispose of these items properly. Keep our environment clean. For more information: www.fairfaxcounty.gov/dpwes/recycling/mat-comp.htm
- 7. Men's and women's clothing in good condition in large sizes. Many medications prescribed for people with mental illness cause weight gain, and large sizes are scarce. Call Jeannette Wick at 703-524-8531 and she'll arrange delivery to District facilities.

- **8. Old bicycles. Bikes-for-the-World is your answer.** You give them your old bike and \$10, they turn it into a prized possession in a third-world country. Find directions at: www.bikesfortheworld.org/donateabike.html
- **9. Ink cartridges.** It takes almost three ounces of oil to produce a brand new cartridge and over ten centuries for the plastic in these inkjets to decompose. Take them to any FedEx Kinkos, Staples, or Office Depot. Or, pick up a prepaid mailer at the post office.
- **10.** Companion animal crates and leashes. Rescue groups always need crates and leashes. Try Homeward Trails (see contact for Laura Bandini above), or if they are BIG, Chesapeake Area Alaskan Malamute Protection at malamuterescue@gmail.com to arrange pick-up.

Electronic Recycling

Citizens may recycle electronic equipment from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. April 28 at NOVA Annandale Campus at 8333 Little River Turnpike.

Items that will be accepted include computers, televisions, fax machines, VCR's, cell phones, scanners, calculators and test equipment.

The recyclers will not accept televisions in wooden consoles, or televisions with broken CRT (tubes), software, kitchen appliances and any item containing Freon.

The charge for disposal is \$5 each for computer monitors and CPU's and \$15 each for televisions. There is no charge for the other items shown above.

Help Keep City of Fairfax Streams Clean

New markers are being placed on city storm drains to educate citizens not to dump anything down the storm drain. The markers were designed by students at Daniels Run Elementary School and are part of the city's environmental education program.

What is the problem?

Every time it rains, water runs off the land and paved areas to the city's storm drains, which dump into our streams. This means that anything picked up by rainfall on the ground eventually ends up in the streams. Pollutants entering the streams degrade water quality and can be harmful to humans and wildlife.

Accotink Creek is the major stream that runs through the city. Accotink Creek drains to the Potomac River, which eventually reaches the Chesapeake Bay.

How can I help?

Do not dump anything into the storm drain or streams. Properly dispose of all hazardous materials including pesticides, oil-based paint and gasoline. Place materials in sturdy containers and call 703-324-5068 for proper disposal information.

Pick up after your pets. Dog waste adds harmful bacteria and nutrients to streams. Put dog waste in trash or down the toilet.

Yard waste adds pollution to streams and clogs storm drains. Compost your yard waste or bag it for collection by the city. For composting information and classes call 703-385-7995 or visit www.fairfaxva.gov/refuserecycling/refuseRecycling.asp

Report illegal dumping in streams and storm drains. There are laws protecting against dumping and the city's Code Administration Office will investigate illegal dumping activities. To report illegal dumping call the Fire Marshal's Office at 703-385-7830 or the Police Department at 703-385-7924.

Use fertilizer and pesticides sparingly. Applying more chemicals than needed will only wash off with the next rain and end up in the city's streams.

Pick up trash. Plastics and litter dumped on the street

or sidewalk will eventually make its way to the city's streams where it can harm or kill wildlife.

Volunteer to help install storm drain markers.

Volunteers are needed to help install storm drain markers throughout the City of Fairfax. This is a great opportunity to get your family involved in helping to protect our environment or a perfect activity for school or scouting groups that are looking for community service hours. 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Red Foxed in Country Club Hills

Country Club residents have seen red foxes recently. Red Foxes are found in most of North America. They are not native. In the mid-18th century, landowners imported red foxes from England and released them in New York, New Jersey, Maryland, Delaware and Virginia. Our red fox populations are hybrid of imported and native species.

Red foxes inhabit a variety of habitats, including woodland, farmland, pastures and brush. They adapt to diverse urban and suburban environments. They are active day and night, but most active at dusk and dawn. Although urbanized and considered sly and cunning, they are actually wary of people.

These small, doglike animals are known for their red color, but their undercoat is white. The backs of their ears, lower legs and feet are black. They go through several color Phases other than red, including silver and cross. The solver phase is almost completely black with silver tipped hairs. The cross phase is reddish brown with a dark cross on its shoulders. Red foxes in all color phases have white-tipped tails.

Foxes hear low-frequency sounds best, unlike most other mammals. The fox listens, for example, for small mammals' underground digging, gnawing and rustling. When it hears them, it digs into the soil or snow frenetically to capture the animal.

The red fox also stalks its prey like cats do. It hunts large quarry like rabbits by getting as close as possible, and then running the prey down when it flees. Foxes hunt even when full, and cache excess food under snow, leaves or soft dirt.

Foxes often smell like skunks, especially during courtship when males and females establish territories by scent marking. Foxes create maternity dens, usually in sparse ground cover with a view of surrounding area. At seven months, kits are ready to leave. The males tend to travel, while the females stay closer

Rabies, mange and distemper do occur in the fox population.

Foxes live throughout Country Club Hills. They are

harmless unless they are handled or rabid (which is very rare; no cases of fox-human transmission of rabies have ever been reported.) Having a red fox on your property is a privilege – they eat rodents and entertain you. Most backyard foxes are just taking a shortcut. If you don't want them around, be certain that trashcan lids fit tightly, never put meat scraps into a compost pile, and keep pet food inside.

Winter diet: primarily small mammals.

Summer diet: primarily insects and berries.

All-the-time diet: road kill and carrion.

Running speed: up to 30 miles per hour.

Jumping height: 6 feet.

Mating season: late January and February.

Litter size: one to ten kits.

Litter time: April to May.

Male kit relocation distance: 150 miles plus.
