GARDEN CLUB NEWS

CELEBRATE FALL COLOR

Most deciduous trees are best planted in the autumn, which conveniently coincides with the best time to choose a tree for its fall foliage. Trees are like people: within one species there is plenty of variability, so if fall color is a high priority for you, this is the time to go shopping.

If you have a chance take a look at The Commons and you will spot a Black Gum tree, whose red leaves positively glow in the sun. The muted red leaves of the Flowering Dogwood, Virginia's state tree, provide a background for scarlet berries that are an important food source for migrating birds. It is important to choose native trees, as it is only plants that evolved within our local ecosystem that support that ecosystem. Fall color is not just about foliage. The berries of many native plants, especially shrubs, ripen in fall and make a bright display that attracts birds to your yard. Goldenrods and asters are the host plants for more species of caterpillars than any other perennials.

But it is trees that support the most wildlife of all. If you only have the time and energy to plant one plant, let it be a native tree.

LEAVE THE LEAVES AND STALKS

Denuding the ground of fallen leaves and dead stalks damages the soil and deprives many caterpillars, bees, fireflies and other organisms of their winter habitat. Please leave them in place wherever you can.

FALL IS FOR PLANTING

With the exception of evergreen trees and shrubs, which are best planted in the late winter or early spring, the best time for planting is fall. This gives the roots plenty of time to establish before hot weather hits again. The only downside to planting before spring is that freeze/thaw cycles may cause some plants to heave out of the ground. Watch for that, and just push them back down.

Historic Fairfax - Eating Houses By Hildie Carney

What would we do without restaurants today? Did you ever wonder how they started? In the 19th century, restaurants were called "Eating Houses". They were operated mostly by former slaves. It was one of the few opportunities African-Americans had after the Civil War. After all, they had performed these duties in bondage for generations. Before there were Eating Houses, a traveler had little choice to eat. Most localities only had a single "ordinary" (a hotel) where guests could find overnight accommodations, which included food and drink. The owner determined the time and type of food, and all guests ate at the same table with the owner. Prices were fixed and regulated by the local County court. The City of Fairfax (known as Fairfax Court House at the time) had two hotels – the Wilcoxen Tayern and

Allison's Tavern.

When more demand became obvious, Eating Houses became popular as a separate entity from hotels. Patrons now had the ability to dine at almost any hour, and they had a menu which gave them a greater variety of food choices. From 1869 to 1899, there was just one Eating House in Fairfax Court House: "Ferguson's". Jim Ferguson's Eating House was segregated and catered exclusively to white customers. Most owners of Eating Houses operated their businesses from their homes and thus they were frequented mainly by locals. While African Americans owned Eating Houses, they were not allowed to dine in them unless they catered exclusively to other African Americans.

"Yesterday, while the colored Sherriff of Alexandria County, and his two companions, were in the village they went to Jim Ferguson's Eating House, a colored man whose house is known to have excellent food and keeps an orderly and respectable house. When they entered the house J. F. motioned them back and said" Oh, no, you can't go in dar, dat is for de white gemmen; you come go in de kitchen and eat wid me and de ole woman".
