A BLAST FROM THE PAST FOR OUR NEWEST MEMBERS OF CCH

Country Club Hills: Those of us that have lived here for a while (I have since 1964) know that the land we are living on was a large farm owned by Rezin/later Albert Wilcoxon. If you haven't already visited the Museum and House, I hope you do soon to learn the history.

Those of you who have visited the property, I hope you also visited the family cemetery!! But do you know who is buried there? There are 6 decipherable headstones but when a ground penetrating radar investigation was conducted, it was discovered there were 52 possible and 25 suspicious graves in the cemetery area

What we know: The oldest grave is the mother of Rezin, Margaret Conn Wilcoxon who died in 1832. She is known to be a property owner as early as 1790. Her son Rezin and another sibling lived with her. It is not known if Rezin lived on that property as a child but we do know that the original Blenheim property was about 1200 acres. Rezin (died 1855)and his first wife Elizabeth DENeale are buried there and the headstones are legible. His son, Albert, worked with his father on the farm and before Rezin passed away Albert purchased 366 acres which is now CCH. Albert passed away in 1889 and until the last living Wilcoxon Barbara Scott erected a grave for him his plot was unmarked. (it's the new one). The other 2 gravestones are Albert's sister Margaret Conn Wilcoxon (named after her grandmother) died in 1904, and her husband, Richard R. Farr.

Who are the other people buried there? It's a mystery! Be sure to visit the cemetery and find out more about the Wilcoxon's!

** So sorry to say that the Annual History Day at Blenheim which is usually held the last Saturday in April has been cancelled.



The Great White Oak

What if I told you, our fellow CCH residents, that we have a living being has been here since before the founding of the United States in 1776, that witnessed the Civil War, and had 245 years of living history right here in our neighborhood? Allow me to introduce you to the stately, gnarled, and historic White Oak tree on Brookwood Drive, named Sherman by the family that lives there. There is a plaque in front of the tree to acknowledge it's age and history.



The owner of the house Teresa Presson, stated, "I have lived in the house for about 5 years and enjoy sharing a yard with "Sherman". My children and I named the tree "Sherman" because Roger Sherman was one of the signers of the Constitution. He served as both a US Representative and Senator from Connecticut. I thought, given the fact the children had moved from Connecticut to Fairfax City, it would help this house feel more like home for the kids if I gave a little "nod" to their Connecticut roots. (I am originally from Virginia.)

I have been told by some Fairfax County arborists (who stopped by the house) that the tree is the second oldest in Fairfax City and is in good

health. The oldest and largest tree in Fairfax City is in the Farrcroft neighborhood.

The funniest thing about the tree is that I will refer to my house as the one with the huge tree. There have been many people who later will say they did not originally see the tree when they came to my house and are shocked to how they did not see it immediately.

It is cool to sit in a car in the driveway (with a sunroof) and look up at the branches and think about all the species that the tree provides a home. One day I saw a huge hawk swoop down and carry a squirrel up to one of its branches. It was amazing and disturbing at the same time.

The biggest benefit from the tree is shade and keeping my house cooler in the summer. It is also neat to have something so majestic in my yard. The downside would be the leaves and the acorns in the fall. Thank goodness, my car is old and I don't mind the acorns hitting it. We get a little nervous with big wind storms but I remind the kids the tree was here before us and will most likely be standing long after us."

White oaks (Quercus Alba) are Native to the Eastern United States. They have a rounded crow and massive horizontal limbs. The bark is light ashy gray. Oaks are wind pollinated and acorns are produced generally when the trees are between 50-100 years old. Older trees are very sensitive to construction disturbances.

At my house on Andover Dr., our own majestic beech (only 130 or so years), a welcoming tower over every visitor who came to our home, sheltered numerous woodpecker species up high while also protecting magical fairy gardens built by our children, fell last summer in a furious, short-lived storm that took us all by surprise.

INVASIVE PLANTS:

Invasive plants are non-native species that cause ecological or financial harm.

They usually out-compete native species for resources such as water and sunlight, and lack natural predators like insects.

They can reduce a diverse habitat of native plants to an unhealthy system called a monoculture. Some invasive species affect the food chain, reducing wildlife diversity and changing soil chemistry.

Invasive species can completely alter the natural functions of forest communities and ecosystems, and threaten the health of our natural resources.

Take a look around! Does your yard have some little mounds of green leaves and a long stem of white flowers on top This would be **Hairy Bittercress**. It is easy to pull out and should be discarded in the trash, NOT yard waste or your compost pile. It will soon be going to seed, and as you walk past them you can hear the seeds pop and fly all over.

Take a close look at The Commons. You will see hundreds of mounds of yellow flowers everywhere. This is called <u>Lesser Celandine</u>. Very, very invasive and hard to get rid of. The Garden Club has been using commercial grade vinegar mixed with dish soap to spray on it.



If you take a walk down the path at The Commons toward the stream, you will find thousands of the invasive plant, **Garlic Mustard**. You find these in moist to dry forests habitats, floodplains, and along roadsides. A long flowering stalk grows up from a low rosette of kidney shaped leaves. The flower occurs in small button-shaped clusters, and has four petals in the shape of a cross. When you come across this plant PULL IT OUT and put it in a bag. NEVER, NEVER, just throw it down.


