## 2 Construction Workers Held In Looting of Fairfax Project

Fairfax County police announced yesterday the arrest of two construction workers who are accused of taking part in a systematic looting of a Fairfax County housing project.

Detectives Lance Greer and Harry Crozen said thousands of dollars worth of all kinds of building supplies have been taken from the Country Club Hills housing project, about two miles north of Fairfax on Route 237, during the past eight months.

Greer said the officials of Stafford Builders, Inc., first began missing supplies last May when they discovered that a truckload of 6000 bricks had been stolen.

Greer said the men, both employes, are John E. Krebs, 35, of Springfield, Va., a heating specialist, and Albert L. Knighton, 27, of Vienna, Va., an electrician's helper.

Greer said about \$1000 worth of plumbing, heating and electrical supplies was found stored in three sheds near Knighton's home. Nearly another \$1000 worth of similar supplies was found in Krebs' home and eight other buildings and homes in Franconia, Oakton and Springfield, Va.

He said the two men said

they gave most of the equipment they took to friends and relatives.

The two men will appear in Fairfax. County Trial Justice Court today for a preliminary hearing.
